He is offering the guitar into the hands of kids who may not even own a guitar. Parents can take the lesson right along with their child for a family affair.

"The school provides free use of guitars," Pyke said. "While the student gets a feel for the instrument (they) can really decide if this is something that they want to do."

Bob Ayers and son Haden tossed their heads back, danced and played facing one another in complete unison for the whole song.

Both have played the guitar for a number of years.
