Street fair a raging success

Encinitas event draws 65,000; festivities to continue today

ENCINITAS — Fifteenyear-old Stephanie Glassen got just what she wanted for her birthday — a day at the downtown street fair.

The Glassen family was among an estimated 65,000 people who attended the 17th annual Encinitas Street Fair, where artists and merchants displayed their charcoal drawings, paintings, watercolors, pottery, jewelry and clothing.

The event is scheduled to continue from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today.

While bands such as Semisi and FulaBula rocked the Karl Strauss Bier Garden across the street, Stephanie's 9-year-old sister, Michelle, climbed a 20-foot exhibition "rock wall" — twice.

"At first it's scary, but after you get used to it, it's fun," Michelle Glassen said.

Meanwhile, the girls' parents — Tom and Marianne Glassen — ate lunch and sought out directions to the Bier Garden.
